Missouri Gaming Ranks High

According to the Missouri Gaming Commission (MGC), Missouri ranks 9th in the country in total state gaming tax revenue and 8th in consumer spending on commercial casino gaming. The St. Louis/Illinois region is the 8th largest casino market in the U.S. and the Kansas City region is the 12th largest (based on 2016 AGR).

Economic Impact Since 1994

- \$6.6 billion for educational programs (elementary, secondary and early childhood)
- \$3.2 billion in capital investments in Missouri
- \$33.1 million to all causes supported by admission fees including \$24.0 million for veterans programs

Casinos – Missouri's Highest Taxed Industry

Missouri is one of the highest-taxed casino jurisdictions in the country, paying a net effective tax rate of 26% off the top, in addition to other business taxes. That effective rate includes a 21% gaming tax (90% goes to the state, 10% to home dock communities), \$2 per patron admission fee paid by casinos (split by the state and the communities), plus reimbursements to the state.

Casino tax revenue is one of Missouri's top sources of tax revenue. Missouri's 13 casinos contribute more to the state in gaming tax revenue alone than the corporate income tax paid by all Missouri businesses combined. Casinos also generate many millions more in annual corporate income, property and sales taxes.

Lumière Place Casino & Hotels - St. Louis Lumière Place celebrated its 10th year in downtown St. Louis in 2017, adding a new high-limit table room, a dedicated poker room and a burger bar named after St. Louis baseball legend Ozzie Smith. 

STUDENTS LEARN ABOUT GAMBLING'S AFFECT ON YOUTH

Pierce Simmons from Washington High School, was surprised to learn how seemingly innocent games can affect small children. "Children are very observant and impressionable," said

Simmons. "Even simple games on cell phones can introduce them to a subtle dose of gambling, with the same emotional responses."

Another high school senior, Reese Peyton Wood from Tipton High School in Clarksburg, was fascinated to learn how underage gambling can change the developing adolescent brain. "If teenagers start gambling with early wins, they can stunt the part of the brain that decides how much effort they're willing to put forth to achieve a goal. Their brains may develop to expect great rewards for little effort," she said.

Wood and Simmons each won a \$1,500 college scholarship from the Missouri Gaming Association in 2017 through Project 21, a scholarship program that educates young people about the issues and dangers of underage gambling. Each year, the Missouri Gaming Association awards \$7,000 to students whose essays, articles, posters and videos educate their peers about the illegality and dangers of underage gambling.

Winners of \$1,000 scholarships included **Muhammad Alasgarli** of Liberty High School in O'Fallon, **Jillian Hackney** of Carl Junction High School, **Alexis Liszewski** of St. Dominic High School in St. Paul, and **Mikayla Cowan**, who is home schooled in Higginsville.
